

## Fair Use Criteria and Checklist

Fair Use is not easily defined and each copyrighted piece under consideration for use must be evaluated to determine if it is advisable for use in the classroom. Favorable Fair Use factors *must* far outweigh factors opposing Fair Use. Please consider the statutory criteria:

- (1) the purpose and character of the use, including whether such use is of a commercial nature or is for nonprofit educational purposes;
- (2) the nature of the copyrighted work;
- (3) the amount and substantiality of the portion used in relation to the copyrighted work as a whole; and
- (4) the effect of the use upon the potential market for or value of the copyrighted work.

Please use the checklist below to assist you in evaluating the balance of factors in considering use of copyrighted work. This checklist is not meant to be used as an ultimate determination of Fair Use, or a substitute for legal advice. Keep a completed copy of this checklist in your records for each copyrighted piece used.
