ST. PHILIP'S COLLEGE TO LAUNCH CENTERS OF EXCELLENCE IN SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS

St. Philip's College is taking a giant step forward this fall when it opens the Centers of Excellence in Science and Mathematics at the College's Southwest Campus.

The Centers, a response to workforce needs for trained workers for high paying careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) fields, are directly con-

At the core of the plan is a cooperative effort based on community outreach, business and workforce partnerships, transfer programs, college preparatory programs and professional development.

nected to national STEM project initiatives.

The Centers will
be home for new
degree programs
launching this fall,
including an Associate of Applied Science
in Power Generation
and Alternative Energy,
an Associate of Arts in
Statistics and an Associate
of Science in Earth Science
and Natural Energy Resources. An

Associate of Science degree in Biotechnology is also being programmed.

The Center of Excellence in
Mathematics will consist
of a professional teaching and learning center,
a math advancement institute, math for alternative
energy and math for allied
health. The Associate of Arts
in Applied Statistics will draw
from high school and community outreach programs and
from partnerships with the University of Texas Health Science
Center and the University of
Texas at San Antonio.

GOVERNOR PERRY MAKES VETERAN COLLEGE CREDIT ANNOUNCEMENT AT SPC

Texas Governor Rick Perry announced a \$3 million workforce development initiative on June 3 at St. Philip's College. The initiative maximizes credit for a service member's military experience for degrees, licenses, and employment within the state's allied health care industry.

This program may impact SPC students enrolled in our health professions programs—Cardiovascular Technology, LVN program, LVN to ADN program, Health Information Systems, Histologic Technician, Medical Laboratory Technician, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Physical Therapy Assistant, Radiography Technology, Respiratory Care Technology, Sonography Technology, and Surgical Technology.

Speakers at the event included St. Philip's College President Dr. Adena Williams Loston; Alamo Colleges Chancellor Dr. Bruce Leslie; Gov. Rick Perry, R-TX; Texas Workforce Commissioner Ronny Congleton; Texas State Senator Leticia Van de Putte, D-TX; Alamo Colleges Board of Trustees Chairman Denver Mc-Clendon; and Physical Therapist Assistant student Richard Morales.

Speaking for veterans already enrolled in community college allied health programs, Morales, a former Army cavalry scout, said the state's new initiative is "an impressive program that will accelerate our education while recognizing our experience." Morales is a student in the college's Physical Therapist Assistant degree program, which is rated Exemplary by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

At the college, the term allied health identifies a cluster of health care professions. Allied health workers support and assist the work of doctors and nurses. These workers generally fall into two categories—technicians and technologists—and work under the supervision of other clinicians.

The Texas Quality Application recognition is the first step in St. Philip's quest towards achieving Texas Quality and Baldrige recognition. This summer, the college is working on the first steps to applying for Baldrige recognition.

More than 800 degrees and certificates were conferred to 400-plus St. Philip's College students during the college's spring 2010 graduation ceremony May 7 at Municipal Auditorium.

The program featured a keynote address by Navarra R. Williams, President and CEO of San Antonio Metropolitan Ministry, Inc. It was the 123rd graduation exercise in the 112-year history of St. Philip's College.

CAMP 98.6 BRINGS HEALTH PROFESSIONS TO LIFE FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS



St. Philip's College is training tomorrow's future health professionals in a college recruitment program that allows motivated health science technology high school students one week of study with both the college and the lead Level I trauma center for all of South Texas.

Camp 98.6 took place June 7–11 and June 14–18 at the St. Philip's College Center for Health Professions and University Health System facilities such as the AirLife helipad, which is part of one of the nation's premiere EMS air medical programs.

June 7–11 ten health science technology students from Harlandale High School attended the camp; June 14–18 ten students from McCollum High

School attended.

During the camp's first two days at St. Philip's College, the students learned the fundamentals of trauma patient care. The students also worked with a professional trauma and AirLife team at University Hospital in a drill simulating a head trauma injury patient arriving at an AirLife helipad.

SPC RECOGNIZES COWBOY BREAKFAST FOUNDATION

St. Philip's College recognized the Cowboy Breakfast Foundation at Artemisia's on June 16. The Foundation presented an \$18,000 check for scholarships.

The Foundation has given \$55,000 over the past seven years to the Tourism, Hospitality and Culinary Arts Program at SPC. Students receive \$2,000 per academic year.

The Breakfast, sponsored by Jordan Ford, is a free feast for thousands of early-risers welcoming the start of Rodeo. It also raises scholarship money. SPC Tourism, Hospitality and

Culinary Arts program students participate in serving at the breakfast.

From its origins in 1979, the once-modest gathering to support the rodeo trail riders has grown into a giant citywide event.

"The Breakfast celebrated its 32nd anniversary this year, and as always, it was clearly a monument to community service and the can-do spirit that the Alamo City has not lost," said St. Philip's President Adena Loston.



FREDRICK DOUGLASS COMES ALIVE IN JUNETEENTH PERFORMANCE

Actor Guy Peartree brought the brave work of freedom rights icon Frederick Douglass into perspective during a dramatic holiday program at the Watson Fine Arts Center on June 17.


As part of the President's Lecture Series, Frederick Douglass: A Timeless Champion of Human Rights in 1859, featured Peartree interpreting the life and work of the banker, diplomat and abolitionist Douglass (1818–1895).

The program at St. Philip's College coincided with the observance of Juneteenth, the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States.

The Frederick Douglass National Historical Site describes the American icon as "the most famous African American of the 19th century. Douglass freed himself from slavery and through decades of tireless efforts he helped to free millions more."

The year 1859 represented a tumultuous period in the life of Frederick Douglass. He was forced to leave the country briefly to evade arrest for alleged activity in the armed assault on the federal arsenal at Harpers Ferry, Va., a precursor for the Civil War.

Earlier in life, Douglass was a key stationmaster on the Underground Railroad, and he was a highly regarded lecturer

From President Adena Loston's traditional first pitch, to an on-field introduction of faculty before the game, the night was an entertaining summer treat building up to an after the game fireworks display.



2010 FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR LECTURES ON NATIONAL UNITY, ETHNIC DIVERSITY IN UZBEKISTAN

St. Philip's College hosted a Fulbright Scholar from the heart of Central Asia as a guest lecturer on June 8.

Dr. Alisher Abidjanov is an associate professor of philosophy at the National University of Uzbekistan in Tashkent and a 2009–2010 Fulbright Visiting Scholar grant recipient in residence as a scholar at Johns Hopkins University.



The title of his lecture, "Ethnic Relations: Unity through Diversity

in Uzbekistan," was well received by a near capacity crowd, said St. Philip's College Social and Behavioral Sciences Department Chairman Jason Fabianke, who hosted Dr. Abidjanov.

"We've had Fulbrighters before, but this is our first philosopher, so we were very excited to host Dr. Abidjanov on the college's second day of class this summer," said Fabianke. "Our students are always interested in having lively discussions over topics that concern ethnicity, politics, and ethnic relations."

The Fulbright Program, sponsored by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, is the nation's flagship international exchange program and is supported by the United States and partner countries worldwide.

A Letter to the President

Dr. Loston,

I was diagnosed with ovarian cancer on September 3, 2009, and within what seemed like moments of my announcement at the office, my co-workers had assembled a walking team and were gearing up to participate in the ovarian cancer walk that took place just days later. As you can imagine, I was very touched and affected by their participation. At a time when my emotions were in turmoil and my thoughts focused on the many ugly, painful moments yet to come, my co-workers' kindness and thoughtfulness helped me feel normal and told me that I was not going through the journey alone. I cannot possibly describe to you how much that meant to me. If I displayed any grace and calm at all during the process of dealing with the diagnosis, it certainly was due in part to the support I received from everyone around me.

Recently, one of the participants brought me pictures so that I could

see them all walking on my behalf. I wanted to share this particular picture with you as one more example of how the SPC family cares for its own.

I hope that all the members of our huge family experience such support and kindness, especially in their times of need.

SPC CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER RECEIVES RE-ACCREDITATION

Programs are accredited by the association for five-year terms. The college's re-accreditation term is May 6, 2010 through June 1, 2015. To earn the reaccreditation, the college's center met each of 10 standards of the association



The center's re-accreditation is a sign that the center is a leader in a national effort to invest in high-quality early childhood education and to help give all children a better start, according to Mark Ginsberg, Ph.D., NAEYC executive director.

"I share this news with great pleasure," said Child Center Coordinator Sharon Y. Evans. "We're proud to have re-earned the mark of quality from the association and to be recognized once again for our commitment to our industry's highest professional standards. The scores we received showed we are at 100 or 100-plus on everything, which is really great."

The St. Philip's College Child Development Center is an operational unit within the college's Division of Health Sciences. It serves children 12 months—to—five years of age, and the staff is currently accepting names for fall childcare enrollment. Services are available to students, faculty, staff, and community members. DOLLAR GENERAL LITERACY FOUNDATION TO START SPC PROGRAM

The Dollar General Literacy Foundation has been awarded a \$15,000 grant to implement the Family READ (Resources for Educational Advancement and Development) program at SPC's Learning and Leadership Development Center.

The project will develop a family literacy intervention program using formal education modules, role modeling and coaching as a means of providing education and information to parents in

the San Antonio area. It will also assist them in equipping and inspiring their children for the future; 260 individuals or families will be helped.

St. Philip's College Division of Workforce Development and Continuing Education plans to use the funds to enhance existing programs by providing additional coursework and information. Marsha Hall and Gabriela Perez will be the Project Directors.

The Center of Excellence in Science will offer an Associate of Science degree in Earth Science and Energy Resources with specializations in meteorology, oceanography and bio-energy. Actual courses from the natural sciences department will integrate with alternative energy and fluid earth sciences. Chemistry courses will be integrated with fuel cells, biofuels and nuclear energy. Geology, physics, oceanography and meteorology will integrate into studies of geothermal, wind energy, tidal power, wave power and solar energy.

Agreements with the University of the Incarnate Word will lead to bachelor's degrees in meteorology and environmental science.

The science center will include labs equipped for the study of meteorology, oceanography, biotechnology, environmental sciences and analytical chemistry. The meteorology lab with a weather station will be used to support weather and environmental studies.

The Associate of Applied Science in Power Generation and Alternative Energy will make use of wind turbine, fuel cells and solar cells to study devices that generate electrical power through alternative sources of energy. Training and certification in the installation repair and maintenance of alternative energy systems will be offered.

The Centers are being funded with Title III funds already in place, 2010-2012 Title III funds, and College Cost Reduction and Access Act (CCRAA) facilities funding grants.

PARTNERSHIPS

Both the mathematics and science areas will provide outreach opportunities to secondary students in STEM areas, including math and science camps for children ages 12-18; the third annual Science and Math Summer Academy is currently taking place. The Math, Engineering and Statistics Advancement Summer Boot Camp and The Women Breaking Through Conference were initiated this year.

In the future, a bridges program will teach students from SPC feeder schools about STEM professions, reinforce math and science skills and prepare students for more advanced coursework. An Advanced Placement STEM course will be initiated, with two Advanced Placement STEM courses in place by 2012-2013.

A mentoring program will also be established that pairs St. Philip's College STEM majors with professionals in STEM fields in the San Antonio metropolitan area.
