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INTRODUCTION

The San Antonio College Fact Book provides general statistical information about the College which may be useful to those engaged in planning, preparing reports, writing grant proposals, or other endeavors within the College.

It is important for the reader to be aware that data presented in this publication may differ slightly from statistics found in other College and District reports. Such variances may result from differences in the source of information used, the date on which the report was generated, or the reporting period included in the report. For these reasons, the source of the information in each table and graph is cited. Trends should be tracked using identical sources each semester.

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HISTORY

San Antonio College was established as University Junior College in September 1925, under the auspices of the University of Texas. The following year control of the college was transferred to the San Antonio Independent School District and the name was changed to San Antonio Junior College. Following passage of state legislation authorizing junior college districts, the San Antonio Union Junior College District was formed in 1945 and in 1946 assumed control of San Antonio Junior College and its sister college, St. Philip's Junior College. In 1948, San Antonio Junior College's name was changed to San Antonio College, and in 1951, the college was moved to its present location on San Pedro Avenue. Five hundred students were enrolled at that time. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools granted accreditation to the college in 1955.

In the late 1960s San Antonio College became a comprehensive community college by expanding offerings in occupational and technical courses and by assuming the San Antonio Independent School District's continuing education program. The name of the college district was changed to San Antonio Community College District in 1978 and in 1982 the district was renamed the Alamo Community College District.

In support of the mission of the Alamo Community College District, San Antonio College responds to Bexar County's diverse community by providing high quality general education, liberal arts and sciences, career education, continuing education, and developmental education. The college has an average semester enrollment of 22,000 credit students and an average annual other-than-credit enrollment of 16,000. San Antonio College is the largest single-campus community college in Texas and one of the largest in the United States.

SAN ANTONIO COLLEGE - THE YEAR IN REVIEW

Continuing Education Network

- In June, Broadway Bank and the Cheever Family dedicated Robert McCall's awe-inspiring "First Men on the Moon" painting to future generations of San Antonio College students and planetarium visitors who will continue the spirit of adventure, innovation and creativity. The oil painting measures 144 inches x 102 inches and depicts the first walk on the moon (July 20, 1969).
- Following months of renovation, in November, the Scobee Planetarium at SAC introduced the latest in planetarium technology Digistar 3, an "all-dome" HD high-definition video projection system that enables audiences to experience the wonders of the universe in unprecedented beauty and detail.

Professional and Technical Education

- This Spring, the Protective Services Department collaborated with the U.S. Transportation Security Administration national education office to pilot a ninehour homeland security certification program for TSA employees. SAC is one of only three community colleges nationwide selected for the program and 48 TSA employees from San Antonio International Airport enrolled. The program is designed to help TSA employees expand their critical-thinking skills while also being observant and courteous despite stresses of the job. Following the program, participants may continue at SAC toward an associate degree in homeland security.
- In April, the National Association for the Education of Young Children granted accreditation to SAC's Early Childhood Studies associate degree, indicating that the program excels at preparing students for careers in early childhood education. As the first such accredited program in Texas, department faculty serve as leaders by assisting other programs throughout the state to apply for accreditation.

<u>Capital Improvement Projects</u> • Bexar County Judge Nelson Wolff, City of San

Bexar County Judge Nelson Wolff, City of San Antonio Councilwoman Mary Alice Cisneros, San Antonio College President Robert Zeigler and Alamo Colleges Chancellor Bruce Leslie cut a ceremonial ribbon in February to celebrate the college's new Nursing/Allied Health Complex (NAHC) and new Academic Instruction Center (AIC).



The 140,000-square-foot NAHC includes two simulated hospital wings with sophisticated high-fidelity Laerdal simulation mannequins (adult and infant patients) and related computer equipment, which students will use to meet requirements for Combination Inpatient and Clinical Simulation Experiences. Additionally, Medical Assisting, Dental Assisting, Dental Lab Technology, Emergency Medical Services and other allied health programs are located in the building and utilize specialized high-tech facilities.



The 72,000-square-foot AIC features contemporary classrooms, labs and offices for Business, Continuing Education, Foreign Languages, Philosophy and Protective Services departments. Comfortable study rooms and lounge areas with huge windows are intended to improve students' educational experiences.

Arts & Sciences

- In October SAC received \$1.189 million from the U.S. Department of Education's College Cost Reduction and Access Act to increase the number of Hispanic and low-income students who earn science, technology, engineering and math degrees from SAC and four-year institution partner Texas State University-San Marcos. With the grant funds, SAC will open a MathSpace Center, expand its Engineering and Biology Centers, and encourage and counsel students to continue toward baccalaureate degrees.
- The Architecture Program kicked off its 50th anniversary in January with an exhibition of former and current students' work. The opening reception featured program founder Vernon Helmke. Also, the Architectural Education Fund was established to ensure that the program's excellent education continues for the next 50 years.
- San Antonio College and Kettering University signed an articulation agreement in March to develop and build a stronger pool of technical talent for South Texas. Engineering students will spend their first two years at SAC and the final two-and-a-half years in Kettering's unique baccalaureate program in Flint, Michigan. There, students will spend three months in class then return to Texas for three months to work in paid professional co-op jobs with businesses in the greater San Antonio area.

Student Success

- Electronics Technology students won 1st and 2nd Places in Technical Skills at the SkillsUSA regional competition. First place winners advance to the National SkillsUSA Championships.
- Visual Arts & Technology students won 16 ADDY Awards, including eight Gold and eight Silver for excellence in advertising design.

Model Programs & Services

 Programs and Services for Women and Non-Traditional Students received \$100,000 in August from the Greater Texas Foundation to fund scholarships for the Career Advancement & Self sufficiency Assistance (Mi CASA) program that serves residents in neighborhoods surrounding the college.

In April the department received an additional \$25,000 grant from the Greater Texas Foundation to fund 2009-2010 scholarships for Mi CASA scholars.




ORGANIZATIONAL CHART





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











HOURS ENROLLED






STUDENT OBJECTIVE IN ATTENDING SAN ANTONIO COLLEGE




INTENDED DURATION OF ENROLLMENT









GRADUATES BY ETHNICITY









ENROLLMENT BY SERVICE AREA FALL 2008




ENROLLMENT FALL SEMESTERS 1999-2008



ENROLLMENT SPRING SEMESTERS 2000-2009




ENROLLMENT SUMMER SESSION I 1999-2008










DIVISION FALL 2004-2008





PART-TIME VS. FULL-TIME FALL 2004-2008









FIRST-TIME STUDENTS FALL 2004-2008




FIRST TIME TRANSFERS AND FIRST TIME IN COLLEGE

Headcount Comparison of First Time Transfer and First Time in College Students by Term Summer I 2007, Summer II 2007, Fall 2007, Spring 2008






Annual Headcount Comparison of First Time Transfer and First Time in College Students Summer I 07-Spring 08 to Summer I 08-Spring 09





BY TERM OF ENROLLMENT












CONTINUING EDUCATION TRAINING NETWORK 2004-2008 HEADCOUNT TRENDS BY QUARTER (reimbursable courses)


CONTACT HOUR TRENDS BY QUARTER (reimbursable courses)




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
FACULTY PROFILE - FALL 2008













